HAVILAND WINS, TAKES GOLF TITLE

Ex-Yale Star Defeats Ross by and 1 in Connecticut Championship Final.

HOLDS LEAD ALL THE WAY

Finishes Morning Round 3 Up, Then Continues Stellar Play in Afternoon.

STAMFORD, Conn., June 28.—Paul Haviland, former Yale University golf star and member of the Brook-lawn Club of Bridgeport, is the new Connecticut golf champion. Haviland won the title this afternoon at the Woodway Country Club here, defeating Frank D. Ross, former State champion and Sequin Golf Club (Hartford) veteran, 3 and 1, in the thirty-six-hole final.

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Haviland finished the morning round 3 up on Ross, shooting a 72, one over par, to Ross's 74. The Brooklawn star had a 6 on the first hole in the morning and a 7 on the twelfth. He got birdies on the 350-yard second and the 385-yard third and also on the 315-yard eighth, shooting the other holes in par.

Ross was one over par on the first, seventh and ninth holes going out and had par figures for the others coming in.

Both were out in par 35s in the afternoon round. They alternated in winning the first six holes and halving the last three on the outward journey. Coming home, Ross won the 355-yard eleventh in 4 to leave Haviland 2 up. The Sequin player then won the 405-yard thirteenth in a 5 to Haviland's 6, and the Brooklawn lad was only 1 up. The next two holes were halved.

The turning point came on the sixteenth, when Haviland, who had been outdriving Ross most of the day, sent a 270-yard tee shot screaming down the middle of the fairway. Ross was back thirty yards and, using a spade, overshot the green. Haviland was short with his mashie iron but chipped up dead with the same club. Ross pitched on and missed a fifteenfoot putt for a five. Haviland took the hole in a par 4 and was 2 up.

Haviland again outdrove Ross slightly on the seventeenth. Here Ross made a gallant attempt to retrieve a shot from a trap, but his niblick sent the ball spinning across the green to the edge. His putt sailed past the cup and he conceded the hole, which meant the match to Haviland.
