## PLEASED WITH YALE COURSE

### Many Back For Reunion Play On New Links. Graves, Freshman, Makes Hole In 1

Many Yale graduates back for their reunions saw and played on the Yale golf course yesterday for the first time. An invitation has been extended the returning alumni to make use of the course during the commencement period, a reduced greens fee of \$2 being in effect. That the magnificent new course will be a popular place for the golfing alumni during the next few days is certain.

The club house has been completed and is attractively furnished. There the alumni will have the privileges of a member, with showers, the lounge room and other conveniences at their disposal. Those who played the course yesterday and who saw it for the first time marveled at its beauty and general attractiveness, declaring it to be one of the greatest in the country.

The best score for the full 18 holes so far was returned last week by Dexter Cummings, 1925, former Yale captain, and twice intercollegiate champion. Cummings' card showed a 76. This brilliant young golfer was warm in his praise of the course, "I never saw one to beat it," Cummings remarked to Ben Thomson, the pro at the course, who went around with him.

George Coe Graves, 2d, of New York City, has made the first hole-in-one on the new Yale course. Graves, a freshman, playing with his classmate, Richard D. Wood, 2d, of Philadelphia negotiated the 135-yard fifth with his mashie a day or two ago and he automatically became a member of the Hole-in-One Club of America.

The fifth hole on the new course is a so-called island hole the green being completely surrounded by sand and raised to an elevation of 12 feet. The hole is ordinarily a three if the first shot holds the green and undefinable if it does not.
